The Community Partner Working Group (CPWG) has been working with the team since July 2021 to develop this preferred cycle network. The group consisted of technical specialists, local board representatives, local community leaders and Mana Whenua. They offered guidance on: key barriers in the area, local destinations, desire lines and required supporting infrastructure.

## Current local community

The proposed Māngere East cycle network would look to address the following key points local to the area:

-  Only 5% of residents currently within 500m of a cycleway.
-  64% of employed residents and students travel cyclable distances by car.
-  0/14 of schools in the area are connected to cycleways.

## Why is this happening

Cycling is a great alternative to private car use for some trips. It is affordable, emission free, has health and wellbeing benefits, and can help make our neighbourhoods nicer places to live and work in. Some of the desired outcomes from these projects are:

-  Reduced traffic congestion and CO2 emissions
-  Healthier, safer people
-  Better air quality and health benefits
-  Better access and travel choice

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**The Māngere East cycle network project aims to promote healthy and sustainable travel choices, and make cycling a more attractive option for the people who live, work and play here.**

The cycle network has been developed through a co-design process with representatives from your community. This process ensures the proposed improvements meet the needs of the people of Māngere East.

## Proposed Cycle Network

- 1 Harania stream**  
A new network of off-road pathways following waterways and providing shortcuts between Māngere East and Favona. These routes connect reserves, schools, churches and local centres to the wider cycle network and provide an opportunity for recreational walking and cycling away from traffic.
- 2 Māngere to Papatoetoe**  
Safety improvements on the existing strategic cycle connection linking Māngere to Papatoetoe and Manukau in the south and Māngere Bridge and Onehunga in the north.
- 3 Middlemore connections**  
On-road strategic cycle routes, connecting to Middlemore Hospital, Middlemore Station and future housing growth areas, and linking up other connections around Māngere East
- 4 Boggust Park links**  
Off-road connection linking Boggust Park to Garus Avenue to provide a 'short-cut' between Favona and Māngere East, cutting 1-2km off the existing walking and cycling connection.
- 5 Connecting to Harania Stream**  
Local links within Māngere East connecting the Harania Stream network to Māngere Centre Park and on to the wider cycle network.
- 6 Ōtāhuhu connection**  
On-road strategic connection between Māngere East and Ōtāhuhu Station and town centre. Connects existing shared paths on Walmsley Road and Station Road in Ōtāhuhu to the Norana Pathway and Māngere East cycle network.
