

OPENING SOON!



Work on the new, fully integrated bus, and train Ōtāhuhu Station will soon come to an end. A grand opening ceremony and community event day is planned on Saturday 29 October 2016. Everyone is invited to attend!

It also celebrates the launch of the new bus network for South Auckland, starting the very next day on Sunday 30 October. The new facility will incorporate the existing train station,

linking the train platform with two new bus platforms and a terminal building via an elevated concourse. Future proofing for a third train platform for the City Rail Link is also included in the new facility.

Ōtāhuhu Station will become a key connection point for buses and trains. All buses to and from the station will also serve the town centre.

Everything about South Auckland, Pukekohe and Waiuku bus services will change on Sunday 30 October

What's changing?

- New bus routes
- New bus numbers
- New timetables – new start times and finish times
- New information at bus stops
- Some people will need to connect with another bus or train to complete their journey.

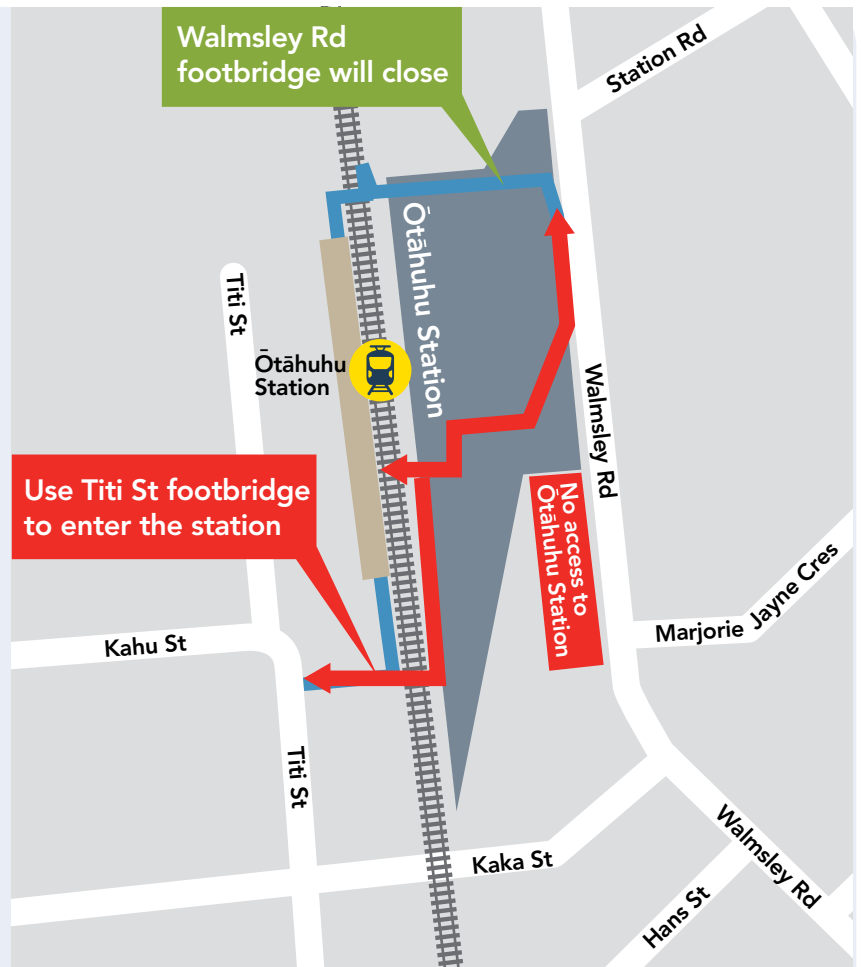
- Local libraries will also have copies

Access changes and construction updates

- The current access to the station via Walmsley Street will close around 3 October 2016
- Pedestrian access will then switch to the new stairs / lift and part of the new concourse. Pedestrians will then access Walmsley Road via a temporary fenced and signposted route across the work site
- The Titi Street footbridge will also be reopened to pedestrians, providing alternative rail station access from Titi Street
- Refer to the map for directions.
