
A quick update from the project team about the work that is happening in and around the village.

What we've been up to

We are delighted to advise that Phase One of the St Heliers Safety Improvements has been completed ahead of schedule. The Auckland Road to Goldie Street section

of the new Tamaki Drive Shared Path is now open to all users, and the associated stormwater drainage upgrades are complete.

Despite some unfavourable weather over the last week, the crew worked tirelessly to successfully complete the first raised pedestrian table on Tamaki Drive in one night. We reopened the road between The Parade and Goldie Street well before commuter traffic started the next morning.

Phase Two works from Goldie Street to the Vale / Cliff Road Intersection started early the following morning. The crew will be improving and re-concreting the pedestrian crossings at the boat ramp, making improvements to the stormwater drainage, realigning the street lights, and continuing the Tamaki Drive Shared Path. For safety and to facilitate these works the bus stop in front of Annabelle's has been temporarily relocated approximately 50m to Vale Road. The construction for the nine new car parks on Goldie Street has been completed and is now open for the public to use.

For your safety

A temporary solution for safe pedestrians to move around the Fig trees in Vellenoweth Green is being developed and will follow the same route as the proposed Boardwalk. This is because the current footpath is unsafe due to the tree roots.

You may have noticed that some of the traffic management set up has remained in place in the Phase One area. Its purpose is to provide road users with 'advanced warning' of the upcoming works, and it will remain in place.



With more work being carried centrally in Village please be vigilant and follow the temporary traffic and pedestrian controls in place. Traffic management is in place to keep the public and our crew safe while we carry out this work. Please make sure children and dogs in your care do no enter any fenced areas and be aware of the trucks and other machinery in the area.
